Observation.

Il faut détacher toutes les notes dont le coup d'Archet sera pas marqué. Les morceaux marqués par un coup d'Archet en haut et un différent en bas, seront exécutés de deux manières. Pour faciliter l'exécution aux Amateurs, le doigté est marqué par des Numéros, il faut observer dans le haut de ne point démancher à moins que le doigté n'y soit.

Anmerkung.

Alle Noten, über welchen kein Bogenstrich bemerkt ist, werden gestossen. Die Stücke, die mit einer Strichart oben und einer andern unten bezeichnet sind, werden auf beiderlei Weise gespielt. Die Strichart, die auf den beiden ersten Tacten angegeben ist, wird so lange beibehalten, bis eine andere bezeichnet ist. Um die Ausübung den Liebhabern zu erleichtern, hat man die Finger mit Ziffern bezeichnet, wobei zu merken ist, dass man oben so lange in einer Lage bleibe, bis ein anderer Finger angezeigt ist.
